Candidates' home addresses: legislation and guidance update

Further to <u>Bulletin 238</u>, legislation removing the requirement for candidates to have their home address published on the statement of persons nominated and ballot papers at combined authority mayoral and local mayoral elections has now been made and will apply for all combined authority mayoral and local authority mayoral elections held in England on or after 2 May 2019.

We understand that the legislation.gov website is being updated and when available the links to the amendment rules will be <u>here</u>.

We have updated our guidance for Combined Authority Returning Officers, Returning Officers and candidates and agents to reflect these changes. We have also updated those resources that are affected by the legislation, such as nomination packs and notices.

Principal area and parish council elections

We have received several queries relating to the home address form and the accompanying guidance, particularly in relation to the completion of the details of the witness to the consent to nomination. We thought it would be helpful to provide further clarification on this point.

Under the new legislative provisions, the candidate's consent to nomination form still needs to be witnessed, and the witness needs to sign the form accordingly. The full name and address of the witness must be supplied on the home address form. There is no requirement that this information is completed on the home address form by the witness themselves.

We have made some minor amendments to the guidance and the nomination packs to try to make this point clearer.

May 2019 polls: public awareness update - running ads or 'boosting' your posts on Facebook

Facebook has made some changes around running ads 'related to politics or issues of national importance'.

This definition includes ads which relate 'to any election, referendum or ballot initiative, including "get out the vote" or election information campaigns', and so the changes will apply to posts that you might want to 'boost', such as posts to promote awareness of the May 2019 polls.

You should therefore make sure that anyone running ads or boosting posts on your behalf completes the Facebook 'ad authorisation' process. The process is simple and, once done, your ad will carry a 'paid for by' digital imprint showing those who see it that you funded the ad.

We have completed this process and all Electoral Commission Facebook ads will carry this digital imprint: 'Paid for by Electoral Commission UK'.
